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Maggie makes a splash

Maggie Valley remains in high demand primarily due to its captivating waterfalls, which continue to be a sought-after feature. While you won't encounter any waterfalls directly on the Valley floor, you won't need to venture too far to experience some remarkable ones. Here are a few of our personal favorites:


SOCO FALLS: Soco Falls can be found just beyond the Blue Ridge Parkway en route to Cherokee. Keep an eye out for a small sign on the left side of the road that points you to the parking area. The trail is relatively short but steep, leading you to an observation platform that provides an excellent view of the distinctive double falls.

MINGO FALLS: Located on the Cherokee Indian Reservation (Qualla Boundary), right outside the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Mingo Falls stands tall at 120 feet, making it one of the most magnificent waterfalls in the southern Appalachians. No special permits are needed for access to the reservation.

GRAVEYARD FIELDS WATERFALLS: Just off the northern path of the Blue Ridge Parkway, you'll discover the Graveyard Fields area, which boasts two stunning waterfalls. One is the multi-tiered second falls, and the other showcases tall cascades at the upper falls. As you traverse the trails, you'll immerse yourself in a valley that was once used for cattle grazing around the turn of the previous century. The hikes here are of




SAFETY - As with any water feature, the trails, rocks and surrounding areas are often wet and slippery. Use caution whenever hiking around water.















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



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












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VALLEY FISHING

Maggie Valley is a state designated Heritage Trout Waters area.

The Mountain Heritage Trout Waters Program was established by the NC General Assembly in 2007 as a means to encourage trout fishing as a heritage tourism activity. Maggie Valley is designated as one of five Mountain Heritage Trout Cities in this pilot program.



Mountain Heritage Trout Waters provide quality fishing opportunities in the Maggie Valley area. The NC Wildlife Resources Commission, which sells the Mountain Heritage Trout Waters license, gives anglers two quick and easy ways to purchase a https://www.ncwildlife. license: on-line: org/Fishing/Fishing-Programs/Mountain-Heritage-Trout-Waters-Program 888-248-6834. The license is phone: valid for a 3-day period and costs: \$8 for residents and non-residents age 16 and older. The license is valid only for waters that are designated as Mountain Heritage Trout Waters.

Parham Park Hall Drive Bridge Hall Drive Jonathan Valley School Fox Run Road Bridge were once a common sight across the United States, but by the mid-1800s, a combination of excessive hunting and habitat destruction had decimated eastern elk populations. In 2001, a collaborative effort between the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, the National Park Service, and various other partners was initiated to reintroduce wild elk to the Smoky Mountains in the Cataloochee Valley near Maggie Valley. Starting with an initial release of 52 elk, this population has since flourished, now numbering nearly 200 individuals.

Observing the Elk

The majority of elk can be found in the Cataloochee Valley region within the southeastern portion of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. While the prime times for elk viewing typically occur during the early morning and late evening, elk can also be active on overcast summer days or before and after storms. As the elk have expanded their territory beyond the park, it's common to spot them in and around Maggie Valley.

The Seasons of Elk

Winter: During the colder months, elk sport a twolayer coat for insulation. Their long, outer guard hairs repel water, while a soft, wooly underfur keeps them warm. Elk may migrate from higher elevations to valleys in search of food.

Spring: In March, most elk shed their antlers, which are rich in calcium. These antlers are quickly consumed by rodents and other wildlife.

Summer: The majority of elk calves are born in early June. Male elk frequently roll in mud wallows to stay cool and fend off bothersome insects.

Fall: The elk's fall breeding season, known as the rut (mid-September through late October), is a notable time. Bull elk produce bugling calls to assert dominance and attract females. Even if elk are not present, people are prohibited from entering the fields during this period. Dominant bulls use these fields to gather and breed with groups of up to 20 cows. They actively defend their territory by charging and sparring with rival males, utilizing their antlers for intimidation. Approaching too closely can provoke a bull to perceive you or your vehicle as a threat, potentially leading to a charge.



Safety

When elk are present, federal regulations require that you remain at least 150 feet away and at a distance that does not disturb them. Failure to do so can result in fines and/or arrests. Even if the elk are not present, people are not allowed to walk into the fields. During the rut, male elk make bugling calls to challenge other bulls and attract cows. Dominant bulls use the fields to gather and breed with harems of up to 20 cows. Bull elk actively defend their territory by charging and sparring with competitors using their antlers to intimidate and spar with other males. Encroaching too close may lead a bull to perceive you or your vehicle as a threat causing them to charge.

Directions to Cataloochee Valley

From Maggie Valley, take US 19 (Soco Road) east toward Waynesville. Turn left onto US 276 North (Jonathan Creek Road) Go about six miles and turn left onto Cove Creek Road, the last left turn before coming to I-40 intersection. When the road forks, keep right. Cove Creek is a steep, ten-mile, narrow, curving mountain road. There is a three-mile paved section leading up and over Cove Creek Gap, and then winding down the other side of the mountain. When you again reach pavement, turn left and enjoy your easy descent into the valley. The road can be treacherous after heavy rains or with snow.

ART LOEB TRAIL

Length: 12.3 miles Rating: Strenuous

The Art Loeb Trail, 30.1 miles long, is a national recreation trail and named after a local hiking enthusiast. The trail traverses beautiful, but rugged terrain, from some of the lowest, to some of the highest points on the Pisgah District. Most of the Art Loeb Trail is overlapped by the Mountains-to-the Sea Trail. It begins at the Davidson River and climbs steeply to Shut-in Ridge. Once up, don't expect that the hard part is over. This trail will take you up and down knobs, along ridges and down into several gaps.


Directions: Go 0.2 mile south of Pisgah District Ranger Station on U.S. Highway 276, and turn onto the road to Davidson River Campground. Park in the Art Loeb Trailhead parking lot. The other end of this section is at Gloucester Gap on FS Rd. 471, where overnight parking is not recommended.

GRAVEYARD FIELDS

Length: 3.2 miles Rating: Easy

This is a popular family hiking trail because of its beauty and ease. This is a moderate climb of almost a mile to the base of an impressive waterfalls. A map at the parking area shows the Gravevard Fields trail system. The set of steps to the right of the map is the start of the trail. After crossing the bridge, the main trail goes left and upstream. A 0.25-mile trail to the right will take you to the bottom of the Lower Falls, which is a moderate descent. Rocks around waterfalls are very slippery. The main trail will take you through open, grassy areas, and past nice pools for wading on a hot summer day. Blueberries are abundant in the fall. After one mile, you will see the trail to the Upper Falls. The main trail crosses the Yellow stone Prong and returns to the parking lot.

Directions: This trail begins at the Graveyard Fields Overlook on the Blue Ridge Parkway.



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From the U.S. Highway 276 junction with the Parkway, turn left or south on the Parkway and continue to milepost 418.8 (about 6 miles).

BOOGERMAN TRAIL

Length: 4.2 miles Rating: Easy

This moderate, 4-mile hiking trail has an elevation gain of only 900 feet. It is well known for the variety of magnificent trees. The trailhead is on Caldwell Fork Trail. After leaving Caldwell Fork, the trail ascends a low ridge to a gap, slabs (runs across the mountain slope with only gradual elevation change) the mountainside with only two additional short climbs, reaches a side ridge, and descends back to Caldwell Fork. It is best to do this trail as a day hike from Cataloochee Campground, a 7.5-mile roundtrip.

Directions: Take exit 20 off I-40 (Cove

Creek) and travel west on NC 276 turn right on Cove Creek road. Stay on Cove Creek Rd. for 6 miles. This will take you 2 miles beyond park boundary. Turn left on Cataloochee Road, go 3.1 miles. Trail will be on the left.

BUCKEYE RIDGE TRAIL

Length: 5.4 miles Rating: Moderate

This hiking trail winds through grassy fields and wooded areas. It provides panoramic views of the countryside in some spots. Cold Springs Creek flows through dense woods and grassy fields on its way to the Pigeon River. The forest shows hints of its past history~farming, logging, narrow gauge railroads, settlements, and signs of recent forest management. The grassy ridges of Max Patch Mountain near the Tennessee state line crown the area. Trails combined with forest service roads to provide loop opportunities.



Directions: Take Harmon Den Exit off $I\sim40$ near the NC/ TN state line Head northeast on FR 148 ~Cold Springs Road~ about miles to Harmon Den parking area on the left. Parking for trailers is also available at lower iunction of FR 148 and 3526



BLUERIDGE PARKWAY HIKES

Milepost 418.8: Graveyard Fields

A short downhill hike (partly paved) leads to one of three waterfalls. A popular hiking destination, Graveyard Fields morphs into a wild blueberry field calling people from afar due to its sweeping views and ripening patch in late summer and fall, so bring your buckets.



Milepost 420: Black Balsam Knob

This section of trails includes some of the most spectacular

mountains and balds in the Southern Appalachians, including Black Balsam Knob, Sam Knob, and Tennent Mountain. These treeless mountaintops draw alpine appearance.

Milepost 422.4: Devil's Courthouse According to Cherokee folklore, the devil holds court in a cave on the mountain, where a walk to the bare rock summit is worth every step.

Milepost 431: Richland Balsam Overlook The highest point on the entire Parkway at 6,053 feet, the Richland Balsam overlook also offers a beautiful 1.5-mile self-quided loop trail.

Milepost 451.2: Waterrock Knob Waterrock Knob Visitor Center sits at nearly 6,000 feet and offers exhibits, book sales, restrooms and a 1.2 mile roundtrip trail leading to the summit of Waterrock Knob for an almost 360 degree view of the Smoky Mountains.

Lake Junaluska Pedestrian Trail: This trail is a prime choice for novices and families. It encircles Lake Junaluska, providing a gentle and picturesque route.

Blue Ridge Parkway: For seasoned road cyclists, the Blue Ridge Parkway offers a challenging and rewarding experience. Some park trails, such as the Cade's Cove Auto Loop, are open to bikers as well.

If you're seeking a hidden gem, consider the Balsam Mountain Road, accessible from the Blue Ridge Parkway's picnic area at Balsam Mountain. This 22-mile route to Round Bottom Road is a downhill delight, requiring minimal pedaling (approximately 99% downhill). However, it's advisable to check with the park service in advance to ensure trail access.

No matter which biking adventure you embark upon, always remember to pause for a moment and savor the breathtaking views and natural beauty that envelop you along the way.



Meet the Original Maggie

They named this now famous resort community for a pretty 14-year old mountain girl with long blond hair and deep blue eyes. To know her story and the real Maggie, you must read *Maggie of Maggie Valley, NC*, a book written by her daughter Patty Pylant Kosier.

This is not just the story of Maggie Mae Setzer Pylant; it's a tale of life in the mountains when this region remained an isolated wilderness settlement. A decade after Maggie's birth on December 21, 1890, her father, Jack Setzer, began pondering the necessity of a post office for the community. He envisioned setting up a post office within his own home because he had grown weary of hiring someone to undertake a five-mile journey to the Plott post office in order to retrieve mail for the valley.

Jack Setzer took the initiative to write to the U.S. Postal Department, seeking permission to establish his residence as a new post office to serve the area. In order to demonstrate the necessity of this service, he diligently maintained records of the community's postal needs for the ensuing six months. Within one corner of Setzer's room, a makeshift post office took shape, complete with a wooden box to organize incoming letters and newspapers. At the conclusion of this half-year period, Jack submitted his meticulously kept records to the Post Office Department, and his application was subsequently approved. In his quest to establish the post office, Jack

Setzer faced a hurdle with his initial name submissions The first three names he put forth were rejected due to prior use by other North Carolina post offices. Undeterred, Jack turned to the names of his three daughters, Cora, Mettie, and Maggie Mae, along with the moniker "Jonathan Creek," inspired by the creek that flowed by the Setzer family's home. Jack kept his daughters in the dark about his choice of names.

In May 10, 1904, Jack received an official letter from the U.S. Postmaster General, Frank Hitchcock, announcing the decision of the post office authorities. The official name chosen for the mountain settlement's post office was to be "Maggie, NC." When Maggie was informed of this, she was taken aback and overwhelmed with embarrassment. She couldn't contain her emotions and swiftly retreated up the mountain to the old log cabin where she had taken her first breath.

At the tender age of 17, Maggie found love and became the wife of Ira Pylant from Nashville, Tennessee. Though they relocated to Texas, Maggie returned to her cherished valley multiple times before her passing in 1979, at the age of 88.

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
